Governance

Of course we want efficient government of the people, by the people, for the people. But, arguably, there is much to be done to perfect that at all levels; national, state, and local. Despite the considerable interest in this area, there are still important issues receiving little or no attention. One of those – how much attention to expect from voters – we deal with under elections. Attention to that will surely weaken special interests in favor more attention to broad public interests, which is a key IOPA perspective. IOPA's governance issue focus will also include: 1) mixing district and at-large representation to reduce the treasury commons problem - a key driver of spending bias; 2) putting the 'loyal' into 'loyal opposition.' There is way too much minority party willingness to undermine the general welfare for possible political gain; 3) legislator strategic voting. This is the art of confusing voters by appearing opposed to something unpopular if his/her vote is not needed for passage; and 4) A likely forced – by unsustainable federal fiscal practices – massive revival/expansion of federalism.

Clearly, along with K-12 education, this is an area that requires productive, high-level attention to preserve and enhance our status as a prosperous free society.
